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The Organisation

The Sports Federation of Queensland, trading as QSport, is the representative body for organised, affiliated sport in Queensland and by dint of its extensive membership of mainly State sporting organisations representative of their sporting activity throughout Queensland, is accepted by government as the industry peak body for sport in the State.

Established in 1992, the Federation is incorporated as an independent industry based collective – the Queensland sports collective.

Its mission is to enhance the development of sport in Queensland by working to promote and sustain interest in the development of organised sport in the State by:

- providing members with forums for the exchange of information, advice and assistance, where appropriate
- formulating policies on any subject pertaining to sport by the collection and collation of the views of members and presenting

- both the majority and minority view to any other organisation, institution or body governmental, semi-governmental or otherwise as appropriate
- assisting in the coordination of broad, long term planning for sport in the State, including optimum use of sports facilities and other sporting resources in the State
- seeking and identifying direct or indirect funding sources which could be made available for the development of sport in the State, aiming to ensure that these funds are put to their most effective use
- promoting its role and that of sport by, amongst other things, the establishment and presentation of awards of merit or any similar form of recognition for skill, service and ability

QSport is analogous to the Sports Federations of other Australian States which collectively form Community Sport Australia Ltd.

Chair's Report

In my report to QSport members for the 2020 calendar year, I indicated that 2020 was a year like no other and that I was pleased to report that QSport came out of it stronger for the experience.

The work put in by the four QSport Sport Group Chairs, the QSport staff and the QSport Board to ensure sport in Queensland had the COVID Safe Return to Play Plans after closure was duly recognised by government on the one hand and members and their affiliated clubs at grassroots on the other.

The resultant positive for QSport and its leadership in the crisis served as the backdrop for the QSport Board to prioritise areas of its strategic plan to focus on recovery and ensuring the organisation was going forward post the pandemic, hopefully in 2021.

As we all know, the pandemic has stayed with us in 2021 and headed into 2022 via new strains, albeit countered by multiple vaccinations that hopefully will see it peter out sooner rather than later.

In late 2020, the Board resolved to review what assets QSport had and might develop with a view to enhancing revenue, aware that one off Commonwealth financial assistance and accelerated State Government support could not necessarily be counted on in 2021.

Independent Board member Terry Johnston began work with QSport staff on the review and by mid year with the exercise complete, the QSport CEO began renewing 2019-20 QSport sponsors with updated material demonstrating the depth of QSport activity, its vital work in COVID recovery, its strategic alliances and benefits to be had via brand association with QSport as the government recognised industry peak body, as the Queensland sports collective.

The end result was a significant increase in sponsorship support over 2019-20 which ensured a positive return for QSport's major profile event

in the Queensland Sport Awards / Hall of Fame Presentation in late November at the Brisbane Convention and Exhibition Centre.

The end of the first half of 2021 saw the Board successful in gaining support for a State Government Active Kit innovation grant for a project that was subsequently undertaken by QSport in collaboration with the Active Queenslanders Industry Alliance and consultants Active Xchange.

This project, due for completion by March-April 2022, will establish the Active QLD Eye data storage system to support multi sports across Queensland and address a longstanding QSport concern over data collection, analysis and access.

Advice of that successful application followed input at a postponed QSport AGM in May by new State Department of Tourism, Innovation and Sport Director-General John Lee that a new 2022-25 Action Plan for the Government's Activate! Queensland Ten Year Strategy for 2019-29 would be forthcoming in the following twelve months.

Two months later, the IOC's awarding of the 2032 Olympic and Paralympic Games to Brisbane and Queensland became the new card in the pack impacting in due course on QSport and its members.

Consequently, the annual QSport Sponsors and Members Luncheon in early November at the Queensland Cricketers Club at The Gabba was addressed by senior State Government officials in Kerry Petersen, Associate Director -General in the Department of the Premier and Cabinet, and Chelsea Warr, CEO of the Queensland Academy of Sport, on progression of activity underpinning the beginning of the long haul to Brisbane 2032 and beyond.

The QSport Board used the above to start to refocus attention on the plan for QSport going forward and the legacy implications for State

and local community sport at its annual Board Planning Retreat in late October and final Board meeting for 2021 in late November.

Consultation on that with members will begin in March 2022 via the first round of quarterly Sport Group meetings for the year and the QSport Conference closer to June when advice on State Government support to apply from 1 July for the next few years is known.

The Board is aware that Brisbane 2032 is both a once in a lifetime opportunity for this part of the world and a challenge to ensure the opportunity to grow the State adequately covers the development of sport and not just the event.

Involvement in considerations of the legacy of the Games then is an obvious role for QSport.

In summary, the Board found 2021 different to 2020, less disrupted but obviously still COVID impacted.

That QSport was able to continue to advocate for sport, to provide professional development for member bodies' personnel along with advice and assistance to members and the broader sporting public and finish the year with an excellent recognition and promotion event is due to the ongoing efforts of QSport staff in CEO Peter Cummiskey and Operations Manager Kylie Thomson, assisted by others including the Board.

In conclusion, I thank them and our principal supporter in the State Government and our other partners, supporters and donors and trust we can look forward to continued support in 2022.

CEO's Report

I provide this report for the benefit of members, sponsors and supporters of the QSport Office in 2021, the second year of the pandemic COVID-19.

The year's activities were impacted again by Covid related issues but not to quite the same degree as 2020 when sport closed and then reopened, the latter in part due to the efforts of QSport via Board member Sport Group Chairs and the two QSport staff and QSport member sporting organisation personnel.

The year started with the usual audit of the previous year's finances by longstanding auditor BDO in advance of the first Board meeting of the year in late February.

If nothing else, it brought home to all who eventually read the final statements that without State Government industry peak body funding advanced to mid-2021 and one-off Commonwealth support, QSport would have recorded an operating deficit for its troubles in the pandemic induced crisis in 2020, albeit small.

Recognition of that reality in late 2020 by the Board sent the QSport Office and Board member Terry Johnston off on an asset review in the first quarter of 2021 with a view to increasing revenue from sponsorships and partnerships, existing and potentially new.

Covid, though, was still an issue, so much so in late March that the QSport AGM was postponed to 18 May at which new State Department of Tourism, Innovation and Sport Director-General John Lee made it clear that both Covid and the prospect of a Brisbane 2032 Olympic and Paralympic Games would likely mean change for how the State prosecuted its engagement with State level sporting bodies into the future.

With QSport engaging with members in Sport Group meetings via Zoom and the QSport Office fielding significantly increased calls for advice and assistance, the first half of the year saw the asset review completed and the QSport CEO charged with securing increased sponsorship support from 2019-20 supporters and with fingers crossed that the main vehicle for support in the annual Sport Awards program would be possible after cancellation the previous year.

Fortunately, that proved to be the case and while four 2019 sponsors were lost and one other was converted from sponsorship to philanthropic supporter, the end result was both sponsorship revenue substantially increased and philanthropic support maintained.

At this point, I record my appreciation of the support from our 27 sponsor partners for QSport and also our donors in John Pearce and Rod Chiapello, support that has QSport the best such supported State sports federation in the country.

I particularly welcome rebel as our newest major partner in 2021 and also new event supporters AFL Sports Ready and Quality Catering.

They, along with other major partners in the Queensland Government, The Courier-Mail, Channel Seven Brisbane, the Brisbane Convention and Exhibition Centre and Konica Minolta, plus 18 other supporters ensured that the QSport Office could roll out another successful Sport Awards / Hall of Fame Presentation in late November, lauded in Parliament and elsewhere by Premier Annastacia Palaszczuk in December.

Like a number of the above-mentioned, the State Government increased its sponsorship support for the Awards as well as introducing two new programs offering financial support in the ActiveKit Innovation and Active Industry Project Fund Programs.

QSport as one of two State peak bodies in the wider active industry was encouraged and successfully gained support for projects that will produce useful outcomes in 2022. I acknowledge that support and thank Minister Stirling Hinchcliffe and his senior Departmental officers in John Lee, Andrew Sly, Chad Anderson, Tiani VanHaren and support staff for that support which should assist both government and sport going forward.

As CEO, I continued to represent QSport on a range of external committees with varying linkages to sport and vice versa, notably the Active Queenslanders Industry Alliance (AQIA) and Community Sport Australia (CSA), the first as Deputy Chair / Director and the second as Secretary /Director.

AQIA ran a series of regional based forums to both provide and obtain useful information on services for and needs of those at the coalface of delivery of sport and recreation, including local governments, while CSA continued dialogue with the Australian Sports Commission at senior officer level on issues affecting State and local community sporting clubs.

Core features of QSport's annual program continued with AICD Governance courses and, thanks to coordinator Donna Little, our Sport Leaders Mentoring Program, plus activities like the Sponsors and Members Luncheon in November and the Legal Issues for Sport Update session from partner Mullins Lawyers in December to end the year.

QSport continues to need an array of others who provide their services "at mate's rates" and / or voluntarily.

I want to thank the likes of Anica Bussell who handles our website / social media and Ingrid Proud for administrative support in the last quarter of 2021.

Also our Awards / Hall of Fame "key players" in the selection panels plus the likes of Pat Welsh, Victoria Carthew, Robert Craddock, Andre Grimaux, Todd Dickinson, Bob O'Keeffe, Shaun Mitchell, Mark Rolski and others, including our volunteers on the night, who combined push QSport and Queensland sport into the public gaze once again as a fitting climax to another year in sport.

I acknowledge the efforts of the Board in support of the organisation, noting the work put in by the Chair, Treasurer and Sport Group Chairs and the assistance provided by the other members and the broader membership of sporting bodies and associates.

And last, but by no means least, my longstanding colleague in the QSport Office in Kylie Thomson, the quiet achiever who assists me and the Office functioning in day-to-day terms and then excellently coordinates the big stage of the Sport Awards / Hall of Fame Presentation at year's end.

There is much by way of challenge ahead for all involved here, albeit with a second to none opportunity to, as the Paris 2024 Olympic Games vision says, "enhance the role of sport in society" in Queensland if we're up for it.

Sponsorship

After cancellation due to Covid-19 in 2020, the annual Queensland Sport Awards program returned in late November and with it the main vehicle for sponsorship linkage with QSport.

After a review of sponsorship assets in the first half of the year by the QSport Office with assistance from QSport Board member Terry Johnston, the QSport CEO successfully negotiated an increase in sponsor / partner support from most 2019-20 supporters, the final figure nearly 5% up on budget and over 22% on the 2019 figure when the Awards program was previously conducted.

QSport welcomed new major partner rebel while other majors in the Queensland Government, The Courier-Mail, Channel Seven, the Brisbane Convention and Exhibition Centre and Konica Minolta increased support, as did many of the other sponsors, including new additions in AFL SportsReady and Quality Catering.

The 2021 sponsorship figure represented 38% of overall OSport revenue and including the contributions of longstanding supporters in John Pearce and Rod Chiapello, this type of support accounted for nearly 42% of the revenue received by QSport.

Board

In 2021, with Covid still present in the community and restrictions easing as the year wore on, the Board moved towards reviewing the strategic direction that QSport should follow in the anticipated post Covid era.

With advice from new State Department of Tourism, Innovation and Sport Director-General John Lee at the QSport AGM in May on the challenge and opportunity that a successful Olympic / Paralympic Games decision in July would pose for sports, the Board entered the second half of the year interested in what role QSport could play in the decade ahead if the Games' bid were successful.

The euphoria that July night in Queensland when the IOC said "yes" in Tokyo to Brisbane 2032 was followed by plenty of speculation about legacy and how the State sporting system encompassed by QSport members could be positioned to take advantage of this once in a lifetime opportunity.

Board meetings from then on, including a Board Planning Retreat in October, started to concentrate heavily on strategic direction encouraged by senior State Government officers for QSport to "maintain the momentum" developed through successful collaboration in the height of the Covid-19 impacts on sport in 2020 and since, and to look to making sport "more contemporary" aided by project funding available under the Active KIT and Active Industry Project funding programs introduced in 2021.

SPORTSWATCH

Three editions of QSport's publication "Sportswatch" were produced and distributed electronically and in hard copy to members, sponsors, Queensland State and Federal politicians, local governments and other government agencies and other interested persons during the year, including Hall of Fame inductees.

QSport thanks Konica Minolta, Kwik Kopy Printing & Pronto Direct for their assistance with production and distribution and acknowledges the contributions made to "Sportswatch" during 2021.

SPORT LEADERS' MENTORING PROGRAM

QSport continued to conduct a self-help oriented program for member bodies' CEOs / equivalents, following successful programs in previous years. This also was supported by State IPB funding and was very well received by participants.

A total of sixteen participants were involved in the program which featured five sessions coordinated by way to be Director Dr Donna Little over April to November.

REQUESTS FOR INFORMATION

The QSport Office fielded a substantial number of requests for advice and information from members and other parties and answered such requests to the best of its ability in timely fashion.

COVID related requests still accounted for a third of the overall number in 2021. Other requests covered topics ranging from advocacy, consultancies, data collection, dispute resolution, employment, facilities, governance, government support, inclusion, membership, member support, professional development, promotion, recognition, research, service provision, sponsorship and volunteering.

Representation and Policy

QSport's role as the representative body for organised, affiliated sport in Queensland was maintained in 2021, noting there was a slight decrease in the number of Ordinary members thanks to the merging of three members to form AusCycling, offset by a slight increase in Associates maintaining a total of 112 as per 2020.

QSport maintained contact with the Minister for Sport, his sport policy advisors and a range of senior Departmental staff on an ongoing basis on sport policy and program developments and related issues including Covid impacts.

QSport maintained representation on / input to various industry and government committees and forums, including the Active Queenslanders Industry Alliance Management Committee on workforce development.

Liaison was also maintained with other State and Territory Sports Federations, with QSport's CEO as Secretary of Community Sport Australia Ltd, formed to nationally represent the State and Territory Federations and to advocate for community sport in Australia.

Dialogue with the Australian Sports Commission continued in 2021 via regular teleconferences with senior Commission staff on policies and programs.



Promotion

QUEENSLAND WOMEN SCOOP POOL AT STATE SPORT AWARDS: ASH BARTY AND EMMA MCKEON FIRST JOINT WINNERS OF THE COURIER MAIL CHANNEL SEVEN QUEENSLAND SPORT STAR AWARD

Queensland born and bred or based sportswomen have dominated the Queensland Sport Awards for 2021 presented at the Awards/ Hall of Fame Presentation in Brisbane on 25 November.

The 26th annual Awards, held at the Brisbane Convention and Exhibition Centre after a two-year break following cancellation last year due to COVID-19 impacts on winter sporting competitions, saw females winning four of the five major awards for individual athletes and teams, with a first ever joint win in the top individual award in The Courier Mail Channel Seven Queensland Sport Star of the Year Award since the current Awards program's inception in 1995.

World No.1 women's tennis star Ash Barty and the Tokyo Olympics top female athlete in champion freestyle swimmer Emma McKeon were not split by the Award selection panel, acknowledging the rare occurrence when a major sporting Grand Slam winner shares the spotlight with an equally impressive effort from a record equalling, multiple gold medal winning Olympic champion in a year like no other.

Women also won the Queensland Junior Sport Star of the Year Award co-sponsored by The Courier Mail and Channel Seven (17-year-old Tokyo Olympic dual gold medal winner in relay swimmer Mollie O'Callaghan), the XXXX Queensland Sport Team of the Year (the all Queensland Australian Women's 4 x 100 metres freestyle final winning gold medallists in Tokyo) and the rebel Queensland Junior Sport Team of the Year (the Queensland Under 18 Girls Hockey team which won the National Under 18 Championships).

Paralympian canoe/ kayaker in Afghanistan veteran Curtis McGrath is the Queensland Government sponsored Queensland Sport Athlete with a Disability Award winner for his double gold medal performance in Tokyo.

Fifty percent of the 20 Awards/ Hall of Fame inductions were won/ handed out to women who comprised 40% of the 65 Award finalists/ Hall of Fame inductees for 2021.

Other Awards presented went to Sunshine Coast Lightning CEO and Melbourne Storm Board Director Danielle Smith as the 2021 Gallagher Queensland Sport Administrator of the Year, Olympians swimming coach Michael Bohl as the LGAQ Queensland Sport Coach of the Year, the 2020 AFL Grand Final at the Gabba as the Brisbane Convention and Exhibition Centre Queensland Sport Event of the Year, Tokyo Olympics and Australian Open tennis official Cheryl Jenkins the Konica Minolta Queensland Sport Officiator of the Year and cycling volunteer official Pat Kerlin the Brisbane City Council Queensland Sport Volunteer of the Year.

Rugby league legend Allan "Alfie" Langer is the 21st Legend of Queensland Sport, with Madonna Blyth (hockey), Steve Corica (football), Toutai Kefu (rugby union), Gail Miller (water polo), Matthew Mitcham (diving) and the late Jack Reardon (rugby league) inducted into the Queensland Sport Hall of Fame.

Queensland Government sponsored Service to Sport Awards went to Karen Doyle (Skate), Ian Mayberry (Motorsport), and Rob Mundle OAM (Sailing), each for over 50 years' service.

Over 600 in the audience, including the Premier of Queensland and Lord Mayor of Brisbane- both acknowledged for 25 years support of the Awards and who addressed attendees on the opportunities ahead via Brisbane 2032 and the importance of sport to Queenslander's health and wellbeing and the Queensland economy- witnessed another high-quality presentation of top Queensland sporting achievements past and present.

In the 26 years of the current Awards program, 60% of the Sport Star and Junior Sport Star of the Year Awards have been won by women and girls – 15 out of 26 Sport Star and 16 out of 21 Junior Sport Start Awards.

Treasurer's Report

I am pleased to provide the following report as Treasurer on the finances of QSport for the 2021 calendar year.

I am further pleased to be reporting that the organisation has realised an operating surplus for the second consecutive year, pushing retained member funds at end December 2021 to over \$450,000.

It does need to be understood, though, that extended State Government Active Industry Fund support of \$250,000 provided in mid-2021 included \$125,000 covering the first six months of 2022 which puts the surplus recorded in proper context.

Nonetheless, the year in question, while different to 2020 in that there was no one-off Commonwealth COVID support, saw a significant gain in revenue from QSport sponsorship based partnerships that was largely due to the return of the annual Queensland Sport Awards / Hall of Fame Presentation in late November after no Awards and only a restricted Hall of Fame function in 2020 due to Covid.

Further, a successful submission for a State Government Active KIT innovation grant of \$79,200 swelled revenue, as did philanthropic support and a contribution from the Active Queenslanders Industry Alliance towards the Active QLD Eye project, to a total near \$700,000.

On the expenditure side, increases in the cost of staging the Awards Presentation via additional contra support from some upgraded sponsorships and rolling out the originally unbudgeted Active QLD Eye project accounted for an eight percent higher figure after lowered Administration and Staffing costs were recorded.

On those latter cost reductions and the increase in sponsorship revenue, I acknowledge the continued positive effort put in by the QSport staff, including producing a well received Sport Awards / Hall of Fame Presentation to finish the year.

With the level of support from the State Government to apply from July 2022, including the term and conditions, yet to be advised, QSport (and its members) will be reviewing where they have landed after nearly two years of COVID and what probably lies ahead.

That said and allowing for some commitments going forward, QSport is in a better position reserves wise than at the end of pre COVID 2019.

I commend the Balance Sheet and Financial Statement to members for acceptance.

1. INTRODUCTION

Sports Federation of Queensland Inc. ("Association") is a not-for-profit association incorporated as an industry based collective. The financial statements of Sports Federation of Queensland are for the period 1 January to 31 December 2021.

Principal activities

The principal activity of the Association during the year was the operation as the primary representative body for organized and affiliated sport in Queensland working to enhance and develop sport in Queensland.

Currency

The financial report is presented in Australian dollars and amounts are rounded to the nearest dollar.

Registered office

The registered office of Sports Federation of Queensland is situated at Sports House, Cnr Castlemaine & Caxton Streets, Brisbane, Queensland 4064.

Authorisation of financial report

The financial report was authorised for issue on the 24th day of February 2022 by the Board of Management.

2. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The principal accounting policies adopted in the preparation of the financial statements are set out below. These policies have been consistently applied to all the years presented, unless otherwise stated.

Basis of accounting

The Association is not a reporting entity because in the opinion of the Board of Management it is unlikely that users exist who are unable to command the preparation of reports tailored so as to satisfy all of their information needs. These financial statements are therefore "Special Purpose Financial Reports" that have been prepared solely to meet the accountability requirements under the Association's constitution and the requirements of the Associations *Incorporation Act 1981 (Queensland)*.

These financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the recognition and measurement requirements specified by the Australian Accounting Standards and Interpretations issued by the Australian Accounting Standards Board ('AASB') and the disclosure requirements of AASB 101 'Presentation of Financial Statements', AASB 108 'Accounting Policies, Changes in Accounting Estimates and Errors' and AASB 1048 'Interpretation and Application of Standards', as appropriate for not-for- profit oriented entities. These financial statements do not conform with International Financial Reporting Standards as issued by the International Accounting Standards Board ('IASB').

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2021

2. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (cont'd)

Historical cost convention

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

Critical accounting estimates

The preparation of the financial statements requires management to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts in the financial statements. Management continually evaluates its judgements and estimates in relation to assets, liabilities, contingent liabilities, revenue and expenses. Management bases its judgements, estimates and assumptions on historical experience and on other various factors, including expectations of future events, management believes to be reasonable under the circumstances. The resulting accounting judgements and estimates will seldom equal the related actual results. Management do not believe the Association has any judgements, estimates or assumptions that have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities within the next financial year.

(a) Revenue recognition

Sponsorship income is recognised upon invoicing of the sponsor in accordance with the terms and conditions of sponsorship. Adjustments are made to this revenue item when the sponsor's invoice is received.

(b) Government grants

Grant revenue is recognised in profit or loss when the incorporated association satisfies the performance obligations stated within the funding agreements.

If conditions are attached to the grant which must be satisfied before the incorporated association is eligible to retain the contribution, the grant will be recognised in the statement of financial position as a liability until those conditions are satisfied.

(c) Receivables

Trade accounts receivable and other receivables represent the principal amounts due at balance date less any provision for doubtful accounts.

(d) Income tax

The Association is exempt from income tax under the Income Tax Assessment Act 1997

2. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (cont'd)

(e) Property, plant and equipment

All property, plant and equipment are stated at cost.

Plant and equipment is stated in the financial statements at cost. All plant and equipment are depreciated over their estimated useful lives using the diminishing value method starting from the time the assets are held ready for use. The average depreciation rates per class of asset are as follows:

Plant and equipment 15% Motor vehicles 22%

(f) Employee benefits

Wages and Salaries, and Annual Leave

Liabilities for wages and salaries and annual leave are recognised, and are measured as the amount unpaid at the reporting date at current pay rates in respect of employees' service up to that date.

Long Service Leave

The provision is measured at the present value of the estimated future cashflows in respect to services provided up to balance date. Liabilities are determined after taking into consideration estimated future increases in wages and salaries and past experience regarding staff departures. Related on costs are included.

(g) New Accounting Standards and Interpretations not yet mandatory or early adopted

Australian Accounting Standards and Interpretations that have recently been issued or amended but are not yet mandatory, have not been early adopted by the association for the annual reporting period ended 31 December 2021. The Association has not yet assessed the impact of these new or amended Accounting Standards and Interpretations.

Opinion

The committee members are responsible for the other information. The other information comprises the information included in the Association annual report for the year ended 31 December 2021 but does not include the financial report and our auditor's report thereon.

Our opinion on the financial report does not cover the other information and accordingly we do not express any form of assurance conclusion thereon.

In connection with our audit of the financial report, our responsibility is to read the other information and, in doing so, consider whether the other information is materially inconsistent with the financial report or our knowledge obtained in the audit or otherwise appears to be materially misstated.

If, based on the work we have performed, we conclude that there is a material misstatement of this other information, we are required to report that fact. We have nothing to report in this regard.

We are responsible for the direction, supervision and performance of the Association audit. We remain solely responsible for our audit opinion.

We communicate with the committee members regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit and significant audit findings, including any significant deficiencies in internal control that we identify during our audit.
